	In this session, the presenters will guide the audience towards developing a taxation system framework for the informal sector in African countries that works. The discussion will identify what should form the guidelines of a typical informal sector taxation in the African continent, i.e. the check list or keys steps to follow when implementing an informal sector taxation framework. Good or best practices in relation to administration, legislation and other policy aspects should be highlighted. The session should also draw from the lessons and experiences of the previous discussions. In addition, the session should highlight the key synergies that African countries should harness in working on a tax system framework for taxing the informal sector with the possibility for each country to assimilate it into its unique ecosystem. This session should also evaluate whether African countries are ready to develop standard regimes for solutions for taxing the informal sector.
